#### 1. Welcome and guest introductions

Membership book passed around and signed – 20 members, 5 guests. Tony Patrick presented NSRA Merit Award plaques to Steve Sorg and Bob Stredwick

## 2. Executive Committee work plan update-2016-2018 goals and focus

a. Membership Cultivation and Engagement – Growing the newsletter by highlighting the scholarship winners, MSRA members and MSRA car clubs. Use of radio stations for media relations. b. 

### **CLEAR COAT REPAIR**

When a car is painted, a layer of primer goes over the metal. Then the colored base paint is added, and finally a layer of clear coat goes on. The clear coat adds a glossy finish to the car. and it also serves as a protective layer from UV rays and other elements that can harm a car·s finish. In the event of scratches, it is important to repair your clear coat as soon as possible. Clear coat repair can eliminate highly prominent and visible imperfections in your paint and help keep your base paint from fading or oxidizing. A faded paint job will make your vehicle look terrible and reduce its resale value. If you lease your car, you will be held responsible for damaged paint when you tum the car in. If the metal oxidizes or rusts you will a much more severe problem on your hands.

Many minor scratches in clear coat can be repaired at home with various clear coat repair products. Clear coat repair is not the same as fixing deeper paint scratches that get down to the metal. Paint scratches can often be repaired with color match touch-up paint or with scratch removal waxes and polishes. There are clear coat repair kits available, but the repair process is different.


Clear coat scratch repair often involves using an ultra-fine wet sandpaper to smooth out the scratches in your clear coat. After that there are a variety of clear coat sealants that can be buffed into the scratch to complete the repair and restore your car's appearance to its original state.

A paint and body repair shop is always another option for clear coat repair. However, the scratches that are so minor that they only damage your clear coat without getting through to damage the paint should not require a professional repair. A paint and body repair shop will charge a few hundred dollars for a repair, while a clear coat repair kit will only cost between \$10-\$20.

Clear coat repair is important, not just to keep your car looking good, but also to protect the paint and finish of your vehicle. A simple clear coat scratch repair kit can save you a lot of money in the long run.

"In the last few years I have really started to get into classic cars and I am currently working on getting a 1959 Studebaker pickup that my dad gave me running. He acquired the pickup 30 years ago when his friend passed away from cancer, at the time it had a Ford 289 with a C4 transmission. My dad had intentions of putting a Chevy 350 with a turbo 350 transmission so he took the existing motor and transmission out, took the fenders and hood off, the box off and the seats out. It has sat that way for most of the time he has had it, until last spring when I started working on it. When I first got the pickup there was about 2 inches of mouse and raccoon poop on the floor boards so I started by cleaning that out and pressure washing the inside. I ended up having to hand scrub the floor boards 5 times to finally get it to the point where you can finally stand to be in the cab. Mice had also packed the driver's side door full with grass and whatever else they could find, so I ended up cutting two holes in the bottom of the door on the inside to flush all of it out. Unfortunately since it sat inside the door for so long it rusted the door out, which is a shame because the rest of the pickup is in very good condition since it has been stored inside for the past 30 years. For the motor I purchased a Chevy 250 I6 with a powerglide transmission to put in it. In order for the motor to fit I had to cut the firewall and tunnel and extend it back about 4 inches, while I was doing that I also patched the existing holes in the tunnel from the floor shifter. I've also relocated the fuel tank, installed new seats, built the transmission cross member, fabricated the engine mounts, rebuilt the brakes, and welded the new slip yoke for the powerglide transmission on to the existing driveshaft. I still have lots of work to do to it but I've only been able to do stuff as I get the money too. I'm really glad that choose these two programs to do in the school because it has really opened the horizons as far as what I'm capable of doing to vehicles now. The Montana Street Rod Association, in partnership with the Helena Timing Association (Helena, Montana) and the Hi-Line Cruzin' Association (Havre, Montana), is offering three \$1,000 scholarships for the 2016/2017 school year. This offer is for students enrolled in Montana University System two year colleges and technical schools, and students enrolled in Montana Community Colleges.

Eligibility for application includes:

- 1. Student must be entering the second semester of a one year program or in the second year of a two year program.
- 2. Student must demonstrate an interest in an automotive related hobby, including street rods, customs, and custom trucks.
- 3. Student must articulate a desire to remain in Montana after graduation.
- 4. Student must provide his or her Expected Family Contribution (EFC).
- 5. Student must obtain the endorsement of an instructor in his or her program by providing a reference letter that includes academic information such as GPA.




## TIPS 'N TRICKS

- Using a zip tie to check travel on an item. Use this when setting up the stops on power windows tie a zip tie around the item and when it bottoms out or reaches where you want, you have your location marked. I have used this for other applications when I have been working alone, such as measuring travel on a M/C rod to see if it was bottoming out and also for measuring shock travel and rod length. Just put a zip tie around the rod and see where it is after maximum compression.
- > Drill holes in leaf springs with a regular bit using white Elmer's wood glue for coolant.
- To remove tension spring, open the hood/trunk to the highest point, slip in washers between the springs, wrap in duct tape, so they don't fly apart and slowly close, the spring ends will slip out easily, reverse to install..
- A very useful and simple trick a old guy taught me when I first started working on cars. Use 2+2(aka carb cleaner) when working with rubber parts. Such as: Any time you are pushing a rubber hose over a nipple, first spray a small squirt of 2+2 in the hose end. It will slip right on. Then 5 sec later when the 2+2 dries the hose is stuck on. Work great when forcing a hose that's just a little 2 small over and nipple that's just a little too big.

Also works great when sliding hose clamps over the outside of a hose. Those damn squeeze clamps that never open up enough even when the pliers are maxed out. The clamp just doesn't want to slide over the hump in the hose. Spray 2+2 on the outside of the hose. That clamp will slide right back. Use again to go back together.

- For my business I need to keep gas receipts and records of maintenance on my vehicles. I found that unused check register books that are outdated work great for keeping records. I just write in the amount every time I fill up with gas or record what I repair on the vehicle. I start a new record every year. Keeping a handy record of oil changes in the book works great.
- When you are trying to bend some brake line or fuel line and you get a small kink or you flatten it through a turn. You take a crescent wrench and make it so it fits snug over a round part of the tube then you slip it over the kink in the narrow part and work it until the kink is out or useable.
- When trying to get the filler/drain plugs out of rear ends or trannys and they are really tight - and you are working on jack stands - use a small bottle jack to push up on your breaker bar - be sure you are pushing to loosen - saves a lot of grief and busted knuckles.
