MEETING MINUTES

JUNE 9, 2012 HAVRE, MT

Bob Degenhardt called the meeting to order at 12:30 pm at the Havre Fairgrounds. The meeting was held in conjunction with the annual Hi-Line Cruzn Rod Run.

There were 27 people in attendance, 13 active members and 14 guests.

Thanks to Barb Salerno and the Hi-Line Cruzn club for arranging the meeting space and advertising the meeting in their rod run flyer!

The reading of the minutes from the previous meeting was dispensed with as a motion to accept the minutes as printed in the newsletter was made by Bob Bradley, seconded by Mike Dean and passed.

Elizabeth Scholl gave the Treasurer's Report. She reported that the cost of printing and mailing the newsletter had decreased due to putting the newsletter on the website and printing and mailing only to members who did not have an email address on file. She encouraged all members to report their email addresses and keep them current by emailing president@montanasra.org.

As of June 9th, membership stood at:

- Individuals & Families 64 (by the end of last year we had 68)
- Business Sponsors 33 plus 3 honorary (be the end of last year we had 35)
- Car Clubs 7
 (by the end of last year we had 7)

Brickhouse Creative and Rancho Deluxe Promotions were given one year honorary Business Sponsor memberships for their contributions to our merchandise program. We have been selling can Koozies at several car events and they are on sale at this Hi-Line Cruzn Rod Run. Conger Studio was given a one year honorary Business Sponsor membership for Jeff Conger's MSRA/DAR photo shoot at last year's Livingston Roundup Parade.

Elizabeth read the life story of Michael Schulteis, the MSRA scholarship winner from MSU Northern. This story was published in the June MSRA Newsletter, and Elizabeth wanted the local attendees and guests to know about the local winner.

Elizabeth made a copy of the income and expense statement available for members in attendance to review.

A motion to accept the treasurer's report was made by Bob Bradley, seconded by Bob Stredwick and passed.

Old Business

Bob Degenhardt reported that the revised constitution and bylaws, updated to reflect our new focus on charitable giving (scholarships), was completed and passed by a special meeting of the organization. The next step is to make application to the IRS for a 501 C (3) status for our organization. Achieving this status will allow us to continue to move forward with our merchandise program and the funding of our expanded scholarship program. It's anticipated that the application will be made this fall and acceptance by the IRS will follow in several months.

New Business

A discussion was held regarding the scholarship offering process. There was interest

voiced by the Hi-Line Cruzn members present to partner with MSRA in offering future scholarships to MSU Northern. They cautioned, however, that they had tried to offer scholarships in the past to MSU Northern and couldn't get any students to apply. There was further discussion regarding the need to establish better communications with the colleges where MSRA was offering scholarships. There was further discussion that MSRA should take care not to show favoritism to any member car clubs by partnering in scholarship offerings.

Elizabeth Scholl led a discussion regarding the MSRA Pick for the Hi-Line Cruzn Rod Run and the criteria used. The criteria have been documented and are printed elsewhere in this newsletter. The discussion included caution about MSRA staying away from conducting car shows.

Bob Degenhardt asked the attendees for their thoughts regarding the location for the fall meeting of MSRA. It was noted that past fall meetings have been held in Lincoln in conjunction with their rod run and in Livingston in conjunction with the Livingston Wheels car show. The discussion focused on having the fall meeting at Townsend in conjunction with the Townsend Fall Festival and Car Show. There was some concern about hotel accommodations, and the suggestion was that hotels in Three Forks (by Wheat Montana) and Helena would be close. The executive committee will make the final decision and the location and dates will be posted on the website and noted in the fall newsletter.

A motion to adjourn was made by Fran Bradley, seconded by Bob Bradley and passed. The meeting was adjourned at 2:00 pm and all proceeded to the poker run!





MSRA TREASURER'S REPORT

JUNE 9, 2012

- 1. Thanks to The Hi-Line Cruz'n Association for fitting our June meeting into their annual rod run! We have appreciated Hi-Line Cruz'n support of MSRA for many years.
- 2. Membership update as of 6/9/12
 - o Individuals and Family members: 64 (By the end of the year last year we had 68 individual and family memberships).
 - o Business Sponsorships: 33 paid and 3 honorary (By the end of the year last year we had 35 paid business sponsorships).
 - o Car Clubs: 7 (By the end of the year last year we had 7 car club members).

We welcome additional renewals and look forward to the recruiting of new memberships and sponsorships, providing continuing growth of MSRA. We request that you ask your friends and business acquaintances wishing to participate to hit our website and down load the application AND FACT SHEET that are available on the site. We will continue to grow the value of MSRA to our members and will improve the delivery of high quality information and advocacy that is rel evant to ensuing the success and sustainability of our favorite hobby! A special thanks is due Barb Salerno for her outstanding track record in recruiting business sponsors in the Havre area!

3. The scholarship merchandise program is off and running! Our membership and business sponsors really resonated with this program and the goals of the program. They took out their checkbooks and sent, along with their renewals, over \$1,700 towards funding the initial purchase of merchandise. We have the first merchandise item (can Koozies) for sale at this June meeting. The price is \$4.00 per Koozie. The net amount of the sale of each Koozie (\$1.70) will go to our scholarship fund. The remainder will go to purchase replacement Koozies for continued sales. We will continue to solicit donations to grow our merchandise program. Assuming a successful run with this first merchandise item, we will expand the merchandise selection to include more expensive items such as caps and t-shirts. These will provide larger net amounts per item for the scholarship fund and program growth. Thanks go to Brickhouse Creative and Rancho Deluxe Promotions for their assistance in creating several years of different looks for this program and quality products to sell.

Again, our goal in this program is to create a sustainable way to annually fund at least a \$500 scholarship to each of the six Montana tech colleges that offer automotive programs.

- 4. We again provided two \$500 scholarships for Montana kids in a second year or second semester Montana tech school automotive program. One went to MSU Northern in Havre where the recipient was Michael Shulteis. The other went to Montana Tech, and was awarded to JT Street.
- 5. MSRA patches and drag plates
 - We still have MSRA patches and drag plates available. They can be purchased at the June meeting or by calling me.
- 6. The Income and Expense Statement for year-to-date 2012 is available at the June meeting for anyone wanting to review it. We are running well into the black with our increased membership, but are still able to sustainably provide only two \$500 scholarships.
- 7. Newsletter costs are shrinking due to posting it on our website (we continue to mail it to those who don't have computer capability). The savings in printing and mailing costs allows more money to be spent on scholarships. Please give us your email addresses and keep them up-to-date. Also, help us encourage all members to give us their email addresses at renewal time.

- ❖ When using a tap put grease in the grooves, it will hold the metal chips and bring them out when the tap is removed.
- ❖ Using a zip tie to check travel on an item. I used this when setting up the stops on power windows tie a zip tie around the item and when it bottoms out or reaches where you want, you have your location marked. I have used this for other applications when I have been working alone, such as measuring travel on a M/C rod to see if it was bottoming out and also for measuring shock travel and rod length. Just put a zip tie around the rod and see where it is after maximum compression.
- ❖ To remove a pilot bushing in a crank, hold a grease gun tightly against the hole in the bushing. Pump it full of grease, the grease will push the bushing out.

To make it easier to install a transmission take two extra long bolts and cut the heads off. Then screw them into the block or bell housing and use as a pilot to guide the transmission into place. They support the tranny and make things a lot easier.

Use never seize on anything you want to get apart! Especially where two dissimilar metals are in contact with one another.

In tight hard to reach places, I tape the heads of screws to a screwdriver. After the screw is started, just pull back and the screw will separate from the tape.

Cut the square end off of a cheap extension. Chuck it up in a cordless drill and you have made a quick power tool to run up bolts. Won't tighten 'em but it saves wrenchin!

❖ Valve adjustments are really easy if you use a Gearwrench hollow extension socket set. Just stick the appropriate socket on the lock nut and drop your screwdriver through the center. Then you can loosen and tighten the lock nut while holding the screwdriver in place.

A LITTLE GOOD READING

GRUNDY INSURANCE 101

Lesson I: The Difference between Agreed Value, Actual Cash Value and Stated Amount Insurance – Do You Have the Right Insurance?

AGREED VALUE policies set the limit that a policyholder will receive and an insurance company will pay in the event of total loss or theft of a vehicle. Obtaining an Agreed Value policy on your collector car is a fairly simple process. The applicant submits an application, indicating the value that they would like to have insured. Both the vehicle and value are then reviewed by the Grundy underwriters, who are knowledgeable both in insurance and collector cars. (In most cases they are car guys who have restored cars of their own and they understand the costs involved.) When working with a new application, underwriters examine photos and any other supporting documentation the applicants submits; and, the vehicle's value is compared to the agency's guidelines on similar vehicles in similar condition.

Ninety-five percent of applicants requested values are approved and bound on the date their applications are received. Occasionally, a Grundy underwriter will request additional information, such as restoration receipts or additional photos to substantiate a requested value. Underwriters will also tell applicants if their requested value is too low or too high. Insurance companies do not like to underinsure or over-insure, and the goal of all parties is to insure your car for its market value and the owners investment. Once this simple process is complete, the Agreed Value policy is issued.

Although the collector car hobby has grown dramatically over the last decade, it is still too small for big insurance companies to invest the money it would cost them to train their personnel (agents, underwriters and adjusters) to understand collector cars and their values so they do not offer Agreed Value. Instead, they may offer Actual Cash Value or Stated Value policies.

ACTUAL CASH VALUE does NOT establish the amount a policyholder will receive in advance. It is the most commonly used form by the majority of the big automobile insurance companies. This is because big companies primarily insure newer vehicles that are produced in the hundreds of thousands and the value at the time of loss is determined by make, model, options, age and condition. This involves starting with the Cost New and deducting a certain percentage for each year the vehicle is old, plus deductions for observed or expected "wear and tear." In rare cases additions or increases in value are granted to owners of vehicles who can "prove" that their car was maintained better than the expected average.

STATED VALUE does NOT establish the amount a policyholder will receive in advance. The term Stated Value is very misleading because a Stated Value policy is nothing more than an Actual Cash Value policy with an upward limit on how much an insurance company will pay.

CONTINUED

As previously mentioned, there are certain instances where an Actual Cash Value policy will pay additions or increases to policyholders who can "prove" their investment. Stated Value was developed 50 years ago (when collectors started investing large sums in great vehicles) by insurance companies to protect them from paying "more than they bargained for." Stated Value is the worst option for any vehicle, because it will depreciate and deduct on the downside, but limit to the Stated Value the upside of your settlement.



NSRA ADDS NEW EVENT TO 2013 SCHEDULE

NSRA has announced that it will add a new event to its roster for 2013. The NSRA Northwest Street Rod Nationals Plus will be held at the Clark County Event Center in Ridgefield, Washington, June 28–30, 2013.

The new event will mirror the existing NSRA events and will be open to street rods, classics, customs, street machines and muscle cars through 1983.

The event will have a 30-year sliding scale, resulting in an additional model year being added each year (i.e., in 2013 vehicles through 1983 will be eligible and in 2014 vehicles through 1984 will be eligible, etc.).

"The expansion of the NSRA schedule came from requests of the members who own these types of vehicles and have been clamoring for NSRA to produce events for these enthusiasts," the association said in a recent press release.

In addition to the car display, the new event will also have commercial exhibits, an arts and crafts show, special vehicle displays, entertainment, and the Super Prize Program, which will be expanded to include this event and any event added in the future.

A complete schedule of events for 2013 will be released soon.



A HEALING MIRACLE FOR BURNS
